▶ Who is the data for?

Head of School, Principal, Head of Department/Senior Teacher, Teachers, Exams Officer and Teacher Support Coordinators:

- ▶ reflecting on teaching
- ▶ reflecting on assessment
- ▶ reporting to parents and students

Types of data

- ▶ Discuss in pairs

Understanding the data – Progression Tests

- ▶ Progression Tests are measured using Bronze, Silver and Gold grade boundaries
- ▶ The boundaries for Bronze, Silver and Gold are different for each subject and stage: English, English as a second language Mathematics and Science

 - ▶ The boundaries are set using a pre-testing process – thousands of students across a wide range of our schools sit the tests before publication and their data is analysed by Cambridge in order to set the standards for each test

Dashboard use by teachers

Grade boundaries on the Cambridge Dashboard

- ▶ How is the data organised?
 - ▶ Groups of learners (your class)
 - ▶ Individual students (your students)
 - ▶ Tests taken

- ▶ What do teachers want to know about their class?

How is the class performing:

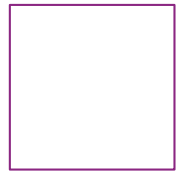
- ▶ on a particular subject or across subjects
- ▶ on a particular strand or topic
- ▶ on a particular learning objective
- ▶ against another class (historically).

Dashboard use by Head of School

- ▶ How is the data organised?
 - ▶ Groups of learners (all classes for your school)
 - ▶ Individual students (all students in your school)
 - ▶ Tests taken
- ▶ What do Heads of Department/School want to know?
 - ▶ How is the school performing:
 - ▶ on a particular subject or across subjects
 - ▶ on a particular strand or topic
 - ▶ on a particular learning objective
 - ▶ against another class (historically)
 - ▶ against another school
